Welcome

President Chris Rusch called the meeting to order at 10:00 am introduced Mark Schallheim, the President of the Josephine County Master Gardeners. Mark welcomed board members, representatives and guests to the Josephine County Extension and Grants Pass. He gave a brief history of the area. Chris noted that there had been a tour of the gardens and greenhouses the previous day along with a slide presentation of Josephine County by Mark.

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Additions to the Agenda – Chris Rusch, President

There were no additions to the agenda. Chris noted that Gail Langellotto, State Coordinator, presented her report at the Educational Forum on Friday but it would be included in the Board minutes.

Board Action Items

Approval of the OMGA Board of Directors Minutes

There were no changes to the minutes. Patrice Sipos moved and Huynh seconded that we accept them as presented. Motion passed.

OMGA Treasurer's Report – Patrice Sipos, Treasurer

Patrice Sipos presented the financials and answered questions regarding taxes paid by OMGA. OMGA does not pay federal taxes but does pay state taxes. The amount is determined by total chapter income and the value of chapter assets. Patrice has retained a new accounting firm and after reviewing the books, they have determined they can save OMGA a considerable amount in taxes this year.

Two changes were suggested: 62001 – Change from Leadership Forum to Educational Forum; 40003 – Underline and subtotal Annual Chapter Dues.

Patrice will hold training for new and returning treasurers prior to the September and November Educational Forums.

Gardener's Pen – Renee Taylor

Chris reported for Renee Taylor that the articles for the Gardener's Pen need to be to her by March 15th.

Educational Forums – Chris Rusch, President

The 1st Quarter Educational Forum for new and returning Representatives was a great success. It was a consensus that this should be an annual event. The next Educational Forum will be in September in Yamhill County. The November Educational Forum will be a panel on "Best Practices." The location has yet to be decided.

Database and Server – Seamus Ramirez

An updated OMGA State/County Officers and OSU MG Contacts roster should be out within the next week. He is only waiting on a few updates.

Mini-college Report – Sue Nesbitt and Eric Bosler

Sue presented a Power Point presentation reviewing the status of Mini-college. It has been included in the minutes.

- The deadline for early registration was changed from July 15th to July 1st.
- Janice Gregg would like to make 5-6 baskets for the Send a Friend Raffle. These funds are given to help gardeners attend Mini-college. Basket themes this year are Garden Décor, Tools for Gardeners, and 1st Aid kit for gardeners.

- A press release is coming soon.



OSU Extension and the OSU College of Agriculture Make Decisive Investments in the Master Gardener Program

I am happy to say that OSU has shown a strong commitment to the OSU Extension Master Gardener Program, via financial investments in new hires and established positions.

New Positions:

North Coast Horticulture Professor of Practice Position: this 12-month, 1.0 FTE (Full Time Equivalent, where 1 FTE = 40 hours) position will serve Tillamook and Clatsop Counties. It is roughly 20% Small Farms and 80% Master Gardener. Recruitment is currently open for this position (closes March 18th, but the close date may be extended). This position is funded by the OSU College of Agricultural Sciences and OSU Extension Administration.

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- Statewide Master Gardener Program Coordinator (Professional Faculty) Position: this 12-month, 0.60 FTE position will work with the Statewide Master Gardener Program Leader (Gail Langellotto) to support the Master Gardener Program in three areas: (1) Extension Master Gardener / Home Horticulture website content management (https://extension.oregonstate.edu/gardening and associated pages); (2) University compliance with youth safety, risk, insurance policies; (3) Statewide Master Gardener Program Administration. Recruitment is currently open for this position (closes March 24th). The position is funded by Extension Administration, Extension and Experiment Station Communications, Department of Horticulture, and the College of Ag Sciences for two years.
- Wasco County Horticulture / Master Gardener (Professional Faculty): this 12-month, 1.0 FTE position will serve the Master Gardener Program, and will provide horticulture education and outreach in Wasco County. Recruitment is currently open for this position (closes March 22nd). This position is funded by county funds.

Re-Classified Positions: Professional Faculty positions have been an issue for the Master Gardener Program over the last few years, particularly when individuals within the position are doing comparable work to Professor of Practice colleagues. Professional Faculty positions do not have a path to promotion, while Professor of Practice positions do. Thus, I was thrilled to hear the College of Agricultural Sciences is working to reclassify two Master Gardener Professional Faculty positions in Jackson and Lincoln counties into Professor of Practice positions. These actions represent a clear and decisive investment in the OSU Extension Master Gardener Program, by the College of Agricultural Sciences.

Increased FTE: Several faculty (both Professional Faculty and Professors of Practice) were hired at OSU at less than 1.0 FTE, even though the expectations of their position required full time hours. FTE has been adjusted for Master Gardener faculty in the Portland Metro region, Josephine, and Jackson counties, to more fairly reflect and provide compensation for their time worked. Funding for increased FTE has come from the College of Agricultural Sciences.

Thank you to each and every one of you, who has helped to articulate the value of the Master Gardener Program to yourself and to your community to decision makers in your county, at OSU, and at the state capitol. Thank you to each and every one of you who has built a culture of excellence in sustainable gardening outreach and education. These fiscal investments would not have come to the Master Gardener Program, if it were not for you.

OMGA Helps OSU Receive Prestigious Carnegie Foundation Designation

There is more good news to share. Sue Nesbitt and the Oregon Master Gardener Association were one of 15 community partners selected to contribute to OSU's application to the Carnegie Foundation, for the coveted 'Community Engagement Classification'. This honor recognizes OSU's university-wide commitment to engaging with local, national and global communities to advance all aspects of our mission through research and scholarship, teaching and learning and outreach.

The re-classification vaults Oregon State into a select group of only 28 universities in the United States and its territories to earn the community engagement classification in 2020 and also hold a "very high research activity" classification, both from the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

OSU Master Gardener Program to be Featured on Dam Proud Day / OSU Giving Day

On April 30, Beavers everywhere will come together for Oregon State University's second annual Dam Proud Day, a 24-hour fundraising event for

transformative education, life-changing research and other important programs.
