Welcome - Chris Rusch

President Chris Rusch called the meeting to order at 2:00 pm There were no additions to the agenda

State Program Coordinator – Gail Langellotto

- Four nominations for the State-wide Master Gardener of the Year and two nominations for the State-wide Behind the Scenes Master Gardener of the Year were received. The selection committee is working to determine the recipients of both awards.
- Several counties have not submitted nominations for the County Master Gardener of the Year or the County Behind the Scenes awards. Although it is past the due date counties may still submit their nominations.
- As of June 1, 2021 the restrictions for counties in the low and moderate risk categories are being lifted.
 It is no longer necessary to obtain permission from the Regional Supervisors for face-to-face meetings.
 Restrictions are still in place for counties in the high-risk category.
- Face coverings are still required in-doors; but, not outside as long as social distancing is maintained.
- Covid-19 training is no longer required.
- There will be Master Gardener training in 2022. In 2019 a hybrid training was used and this may be used again in 2022.
- A reduction in volunteer hours is being considered. The mean number of hours in Oregon is 66.
- They are working on a Statewide Needs Assessment to determine the preferred type and form of Master Gardener education. The focus is on how to serve gardeners. Master Gardeners may be also to assist with the interview portion of the assessment.

OMGA Treasurer's Report – Patrice Sipos, Treasurer

- There is a new version of Quick Books. Although the program is updated regularly the changes are normally very small and there is no need for updating. However, it may be time for us to update the versions we are using. Normally it is only necessary every 2 3 years.
- We were all sad to learn that Patrice has resigned as OMGA Treasurer. Her husband is quite ill. She has done a fabulous job and we appreciate all the time and hard work she has given to OMGA.
