# **Good books for gardeners**

# 154 gifts were given

booklets, saving the program money and providing supplies for **at least two years.** This was the first year the Master Gardener Program was invited to participate. Thank you to all who donated! Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer. Reviewed by Donna Leveridge-Campbell, Coos County

*Braiding Sweetgrass* has so much to offer and I believe other gardeners would especially appreciate this book, as I do. As one who loves her children and also loves her garden, Kimmerer lists some "loving behaviors" and makes the case that "The land loves us back... She provides for us and teaches us to provide for ourselves. That is what good mothers do."

Kimmerer speaks from multiple perspectives as an Indigenous woman, a mother, a gardener, a botanist and professor of plant ecology and from many other aspects of herself. She explains scientific and indigenous knowledge in an easy-to-read, poetic

style. She integrates mind, body, emotion and spirit and shares "healing stories that allow us to imagine a different relationship, in which people and land are good medicine for each other." This gives me hope.

The author addresses many of my own concerns, moral dilemmas and feelings of guilt as a relatively ignorant and clumsy human on this Earth, trying to decide what to do - or not do. Kimmerer shares her journey toward greater understanding of her place in the world and the roles of humans in the web of life. "The most important thing each of us can know is our unique gift and how to use it in the world." I believe this is a hugely important book for our times.



#### The Scentual Garden: Exploring the World of Botanical Fragrance by Ken Druse. Reviewed by Terry Wagner, Washington County

In this delightful garden-centric book, Druse has given us an entrancing way to more fully enjoy our experiences in the garden world. What we usually find in plant descriptions regarding smell is the word "fragrant." If you would like to get beyond this non-illuminating description, this is the book for you. The author has divided familiar and unusual garden plants, shrubs and trees into 12 categories of scent: Animalic, Balsamic/Resinous, Floral/Sweet, Forest, Fruity, Heavy, Herbal/Green, Honey, Indolic, Medicinal, Rose and Spice. His book also gives us a view into why plants smell (it's not for our benefit), how to get the most out of the many fragrances, and how to capture scents while we are exploring the plant world. The combination of words and photographs will likely touch a part of your brain where smell is evocative of memory and emotion.
